# What is a Pragmatic Trial?

Pragmatic trials address 'real world effectiveness', usually for interventions for which evidence already exists for 'efficacy'.


External validity is emphasized by utilizing:

- patient populations like those who would ordinarily be exposed to the treatment,
- interventions administered in standard clinical settings,
- representative practitioners.

Pragmatic trials should not sacrifice rigor. Strategies to achieve large representative patient populations are essential.

Randomization in pragmatic trials is often at the system rather than individual level.

# Seven Questions: Pragmatic Trials from the Current NIH HCS Collaboratory

1. **Nocturnal blood pressure control:** Does taking anti-hypertensive medications at night reduce CV events?
2. **Longer dialysis duration:** Does a system-wide approach to increase dialysis duration reduce mortality?
3. **Preventing hospital acquired infections:** Do intensified antibacterial bathing measures reduce infections?
4. **Suicide prevention:** Does a intervention for patients who acknowledge suicidal thoughts reduce attempts?
5. **Colorectal cancer screening:** Does a simple intervention implemented through Federally Qualified Health Centers improve colorectal cancer screening?



**Description:** Low back pain, an Institute of Medicine priority condition for comparative effectiveness research, is of major public health importance. It is one of the most common reasons for physician visits and an important cause of functional limitation and disability. Imaging is frequently performed as part of the diagnostic evaluation and is an important contributor to the cost of back pain care, which totaled more than \$86 billion in 2005.
